Chief William J. Winters

Bill Winters was hired as Chief of Police on August 30, 1965. At that time, the City of Chula Vista had a population of 75,000 and 107 peace officers and civilian employees. He retired in October 18, 1991, and the city's population had grown to 138,000 with the Police Department numbering 232. Bill Winters said, "As I look back over the twenty-six years, I am very proud of the accomplishments and reputation of the Police Department, made possible by scores of dedicated and professional employees." Some of the highlights of this period include:

(1) The planning and construction of a new police facility in 1971. This allowed the department to move from a very crowded 6,500 square foot area in the City Hall to a new facility with a hall do not conscitute of 50,000.

facility with a build-out capacity of 50,000 square feet.

(2) An "Educational Incentive Program" for officers that rewarded educational achievement with additional salary and motivated officers to seek college degrees.

- (3) One of the first departments to utilize the "four-ten" shift plan for uniformed patrol officers.
- (4) In the late 1960s the department identified a significant increase in juvenile delinquency recidivism, and several programs were developed to diminish this problem. They included the formulation of a film to be shown to juveniles and their parents, civilian juvenile counselors working in the police department, and detectives assigned to each high school and junior high school.
- (5) A Police Reserve force with a total strength of 100 who provided over 30,000 hours of volunteer assistance annually.
- (6) The formation of an Explorer Scout program that provided significant community service and resulted in many of these scouts becoming peace officers.
- (7) In 1984 the Police Officers' Association successfully negotiated for the 2% at 50 Retirement Plan after many years of frustration and animosity at the bargaining table over this issue.
- (8) The Montgomery Annexation in 1986. The Police Department was tasked to hire twentynine new employees and make plans to take over the policing of an additional 4.5 square miles and 24,000 people within five months.

(9) Judges and members of the District Attorney's Office often praised the Chula Vista Police Department as the best in the county based on our criminal investigations and court presentations.

The department earned the reputation as a place where employees were part of a "family," and this usually resulted in good morale and excellent service to the community. During his years with the department, Chief Winters had the opportunity to work with dedicated, effective employees who made a positive difference in the lives of the people they served. He considered himself very fortunate to be a member of this department and said without reservation that he thoroughly enjoyed his job and the many friendships he had experienced over the years.

The Chula Vista Police Department's First Commemorative Book

In July of 1991, a member of our department approached me with an idea about publishing a book of photographs depicting our department's history. I agreed it was a great idea and presented it to the QWL Committee and the Chula Vista Police Officers' Association Board of Directors. Both groups approved of the idea and selected me to be Editor of this book. I certainly didn't know anything about publishing and, being a firm believer that "several" heads are better than one, rounded up several willing (?) assistants.

Our fledgling committee had ten members: Martha Valdivia, Alvina Harris, Millie Osuna, Tina Jones, Lisa Bourgeois, Randy Poff, Wayne Maxey, Ron Lederle, and Doug Traubel.

When we started this venture we had the full support of the QWL Committee and the CVPOA. Later on, we lost the support of the QWL, and those of us on the staff spent a lot of our own time preparing this book. We never lost sight of publishing this book, we just lost bodies and some lost interest.

Martha Valdivia and Wayne Maxey were the catalysts in completing the portrait section, which is the largest and hardest section of the book. Once this section was completed, the remaining sections were all down hill (we thought!). Organizing photo shoots with groups and individuals was a task in itself, and was definitely the most difficult endeavor. The photo shoots were finally completed on October 7, 1994.

We were initially going to use Taylor Publications out of Dallas, Texas. They publish the majority of school and law enforcement annuals and have a good track record. We later decided to use a local publishing company, Tecolote Publications, because of the reduced expense and the opportunity to work closely with the publisher.

We'd like for our readers to understand that we're just a bunch of law enforcement personnel, with very limited knowledge and resources, who tried to publish a book. Our goal was to publish a quality product that would be enjoyed by friends, family, and co-workers. This commemorative book is a first for our department, and the time spent compiling the photos and history has been both frustrating and rewarding. We thank you for your patience and understanding and hope you'll enjoy this first commemorative book effort.



A Historical Summary of the Chula Vista Police Department



Sgt. Robert Zeitelhack

In October 1969, Sergeant Bob was involved in an on-duty accident in which he was struck by a vehicle at the intersection of Third and F Street while on his motorcycle. He sustained a broken foot and back injury leading to his disability retirement in October of 1974. Bob and Teri are happily retired in Tomahawk, Wisconsin.

This Historical Section is dedicated to retired Sergeant Robert Zeitelhack for his twenty and one-half years of dedicated service to the Chula Vista Police Department. He was known affectionately as "Sergeant Bob" by the School Safety Patrol youngsters who worked under his leadership. He was well known by the citizens and business owners of our city. For many years he administered the School Safety Program, accompanying the group to meet the Governor of California, annually travelling to Knott's Berry Farm, and participating in a post-school week at a camp on Palomar Mountain.

On October 17, 1911, the little community to be known as Chula Vista, California, incorporated, taking its first step toward becoming an independent city.

A standing committee, under the supervision of a Board of Trustees, was organized and maintained for the purpose of establishing and enforcing a Code of Public Health and Morals. This was the first move to set up a form of law enforcement.

Darwin Black was appointed City Marshal on November 28, 1911, becoming the new city's first law enforcement officer. With a new officer appointed, it was necessary that a code of laws be adopted. On January 13, 1912, an Ordinance was adopted prescribing and designating "where persons sentenced to imprisonment for violation of any ordinance of the City of Chula Vista shall be imprisoned." (Ordinance No. 4) The record fails to indicate the location of any place of incarceration.




In 1913 the first City Hall was located at 194 Third Avenue. The cost is recorded as \$2,600 with \$200 down payment. It was financed through a local bank with \$2,400 to be paid within one year.

During 1946-47, the city council authorized the purchase of a nine-acre site for \$12,500, which became the present Civic Center at 276 Fourth Avenue. The City Hall was constructed in 1950 at a cost of \$99,450. The Police Department was located at the south end.

June D. Moeser

In 1955, June Moeser became the first Chula Vista policewoman and was assigned to "Special Duty." She graduated from the San Diego Police Academy in 1956 with 23 policemen. She worked on call from any division in the department when and where needed. During her duty, she was assigned by the City Manager and Chief of Police to write the first history of the Chula Vista Police Department.

In addition to being Chula Vista's first Policewoman, she went on to become the first Policewoman in Imperial Beach and then the first female Marshal in the South Bay, working at the Municipal Court from 1958 to 1963. Years later, when she was appointed to the Grand Jury, she was the first woman foreman, serving from 1977 to 1978.

The Communications Center inputs, dispatches, and tracks all calls for police service for the city of Chula Vista, and all calls for fire and medical service for the Zone Five Fire District (Chula Vista, National City, Bonita, and Imperial Beach).







Police Reserves

Chula Vista Reserves volunteered 14,704 hours during 1993. Of this total, 10,603 hours were spent on Chula Vista patrol activities, 3,100 were spent in administrative duties, and 1,001 hours were spent in assisting other police departments. Thirteen reserve officers donated in excess of 400 hours each during the year; the mandatory requirement was only 196 hours.

BUSINESS OFFICE

The Business Office provides support services to all sections of the Police Department. In addition to the processing of all requisitions for department supplies and services, Business Office personnel input police documents into automated regional and state computer systems (Criminal Information Systems Unit); transcribe all dictated reports by patrol officers (Police Report Transcription Unit); process crime, arrest and accident reports, field interviews and citations (Records Division); and provide payroll support for the department (Payroll Unit). Community Service Officers, working as part of the Business Office team, staff the Police Department front counter.

ANIMAL CONTROL

The Animal Control Section provides full Animal Control services to the City of Chula Vista and the City of Imperial Beach. Kennel space and animal handling services are provided to National City as well. Animal Control personnel are dedicated professionals who keep the bes interests and safety of the public in mind, while having compassion for animals as well.

CRIME ANALYSIS UNIT

The Crime Analysis Unit is responsible for providing analytical and statistical support for operational and administrative staff. Information provided assists with deployment of personnel, development of tactical actions, and administrative decision making. The unit disseminates bi-weekly crime analysis bulletins for operations personnel, and identifies and analyzes serial and pattern crimes. Monthly, quarterly, and annual statistical reports, summarizing crime and arrest information, are also distributed. The unit serves as the liaison for State Parole, conducts training on local and regional automated systems, and manages the department's local area network.

CRIME LABORATORY

Forensic Section

The Forensic section of the Crime Laboratory is responsible for the detection and interpretation of physical evidence, as well as providing department training in Evidence Technology and Fingerprint Identification. Forensic personnel investigate and document crime scenes; collect, interpret, compare, and scientifically analyze physical evidence; and manage the latent print examination process, including operation of the CAL-ID system.

SWAT

The Chula Vista Police Department SWAT Team, formed in 1972, was the first SWAT Team in San Diego County. During 1993, the team was involved in six missions, including service of two high risk warrants. The team also responded to two incidents involving armed barricaded suspects. Flash bangs and chemical agents were used during two of the incidents. The SWAT Team is composed of 1 Commander, 5 Team Leaders, and 11 Team Members. SWAT personnel perform their SWAT duties in addition to working full time Patrol or Investigative assignments.

HOSTAGE NEGOTIATING TEAM

CRIME SUPPRESSION UNIT

The Crime Suppression Unit, referred to as the Narcotics Enforcement Team (NET) as of 1994, routinely uses surveillances, controlled buys, search warrants, and informants to combat illegal narcotics activity. Three agents and three officers concentrate on street and mid-level narcotics dealers within Chula Vista, which includes the evaluation and investigation of citizen complaints of possible drug-related activity. The remaining two officers are assigned to a multi-agency task force, the Narcotics Task Force, which targets midand high-level drug dealers. Crime Suppression Unit members frequently testify as narcotics experts in criminal proceedings and assist the Patrol Division with complex narcotics related investigations.

CRIMES OF VIOLENCE UNIT

The Crimes of Violence Unit investigates crimes such as homicide, robbery, kidnapping, domestic violence, vandalism, annoying phone calls, and disturbing the peace. The unit was kept busy with an unusually high number of homicides, 14, during 1993. One of the homicides occurred in July at a real estate office in Bonita. The suspect was taken into custody by the management of the Century 21 office, and held until Chula Vista police personnel responded. The unit also investigated a high number of robberies which were series related.

STREET TEAM (No photograph available.)

The Street Team concept was introduced to the department in 1993, and a team of officers was selected in December. The purpose of the team is to provide proactive enforcement and develop intelligence on criminal elements working within the city. The team also works with community residents & business owners to assist with resolution of identified problems. Although the team works all crimes, robberies and vehicle thefts are targeted.

Since its inception, the Street Team has been very successful. Assisted with information provided by the Crime Analysis Unit, the team has been able to both observe and apprehend felony suspects committing crimes. Working a flexible schedule, the team is able to assist patrol officers when calls for service are high, as well as assisting investigators and crime prevention officers.

PROPERTY CRIMES UNIT

The Property Crimes Unit is responsible for the investigation of property related crimes such as burglary, fraud/forgery, arson, and auto theft. In addition, Property Crimes Investigators are responsible for licensing, bingo, card rooms, pawnshops, and interpretation and enforcement of many Chula Vista Municipal Codes and Ordinances.

TRAFFIC BUREAU

The Traffic Bureau is responsible for enforcement of traffic laws and the investigation of motor vehicle collisions.


